Program Notes

DAY 1 - MEMORY - Tuesday 2 October 2007

'Surviving Survival – Holocaust Survivors Remembering their Past' – Dr Sharon Kangisser-Cohen, University of Sydney This paper discusses how Holocaust survivors remember and communicate their experiences. Specifically it will present how the social-cultural context has shaped what, when and how Holocaust survivors speak about their traumatic past.

'National Curriculum and the Jimmy Durante Factor'

- Dr Tony Taylor, Monash University

Famously, Jimmy Durante remarked 'everybody wants to get into the act', and now that the idea of a national curriculum has been adopted by both major political parties, the number of actors auditioning for roles & the various scripts they're reading from may lead to national curriculum confusion. Is there a clear way forward? Taylor will outline the issues & some possible solutions.

1A 'History's Children: how kids remember history'

- Dr Anna Clark, Monash University

School history has been a central site of the history wars. Questions of what history to teach, and how to teach it, have generated heated arguments among historians, politicians & public commentators. Yet glaringly absent from this debate have been the voice of students and teachers.

1B 'Changing Perceptions of the Kokoda Campaign'

- Stuart Braga, former Senior Master of Trinity Grammar Seen as an arduous campaign vital to Australia's survival, the name Kokoda has emerged as an icon of Australian endurance in extreme conditions in WWII. This paper will discuss how the 'Anzac Legend' has over time also been applied to Kokoda.

1C 'Museums, Memory & History: displaying the Holocaust' – Avril Alba, Sydney Jewish Museum

Are museums keepers of memory or history? What do history students stand to gain from the Museum experience, & what are the dangers? Using the Holocaust as our case study we'll explore some contentious historical issues that arise in the Museum context, particularly in attempting to 'display' traumatic history.

1D '50 Years On: a retrospective view on the 1st rock'n'roll tours of Australia' – Bernie Howitt, Narara Valley HS
An examination of the first 2 rock 'n 'roll tours of Australia in 1957 by Bill Haley and Little Richard as a basis for exploring continuity and change.

1E: 'Using Oral Histories in the Classroom: WWII POWs'

 Tracy Sullivan, Australian History Museum, Macquarie Uni Explore strategies for integrating the use of oral histories in the classroom using resources from the Australian History Museum's section of interviews with former WWII POWs of the Japanese.

2A 'Myth & Memory on the British Home front 1939-45

- Steve Dixon, HT Kirrawee High School

This session will look at how our perceptions of the past are affected by the memories we choose to perpetuate.

2B 'Making the most of Memory' – John Hockney, professional storyteller, facilitator of 'Your Life – Your Story' workshops This session will demonstrate techniques, ideas and question compilation for accessing memory in order to 'unlock life stories'.

2C 'Technology in the Classroom'

- Kieran O'Regan, Carlingford High School

This workshop will look at how to find good quality interactive educational websites and incorporate them into user friendly ICT lessons, lesson ideas blending traditional skills with ICT activities and on-line programming and assessment tasks.

2D& 3D: 'Remembrance – a farewell to the generation passing into history' – Film Screening Part 1 & 2

Larry McGrath film-maker, and Rev. Roy Wotton, WWII Veteran 'Remembrance' is a powerful documentary memoir of 8 Australian WWII veterans. It will include a unique Q&A session with the filmmaker and featured WWII veteran from Kokoda.

3A 'Public Memory & History: Theory and Practice' – *Michael Wohltmann, Marden Senior College, SA*How is public memory used in Australia – what is included, what is excluded, and how does this 'distort' history? Public memory theory as well as classroom application will be covered.

3B 'Stories, Sources & Serendipity: odd directions that field work research on Gallipoli have taken'—Jennifer Lawless, BOS During field work on the investigation of Gallipoli POWs, research can take odd turns – turning up fascinating oral history, and verification of sources in odd places.

3C 'Blurring the Boundaries of Information Literacy: Holocaust denial on the internet' – *James Goulding*. This paper will consider how the phenomenon of Holocaust denial relates to the current conceptions of information literacy in NSW classrooms, and will explore some simple yet effective strategies to help students critically and meaningfully engage with web-

based historical information.

'The Use and Abuse of Sources in Aboriginal History' – Keith Windschuttle, author of 'Killing History', 'White Australia Policy'. This paper will examine how historians of the past 30 yrs have used oral and documentary sources in writing about Aboriginal history. It will present examples from some celebrated case studies which the presenter is currently researching for his series The Fabrication of Aboriginal History. The occasion of this conference will be the 1st public presentation of these examples.

'The Return of the Stolen Generation' – *Prof. Peter Read, University of Sydney, co-founder Stolen Generations Link Up* This paper will present a history of the Aboriginal child removal controversy 1975-2007, with particular emphasis on the history of the Link Up organisations, and the controversies that have ensued, especially since the release of 'Bringing them Home'.

- 1A 'Transitions, Curriculum Mapping and the Building Blocks of History' Ben Hinves, Haileybury College
 Primary to Secondary, and Secondary to Tertiary. What expectations do teachers and institutions have of each other & students in transition? What knowledge do teachers have of the differing agendas & curriculums at each level of History education? By addressing these communication gaps, can more effective curriculum mapping take place at the secondary level?
- **1B** 'Thucydides and the History of Ideas: numbers, war and understanding' *Dr Neil Morpeth, University of Newcastle*This will account for the 'faces' of conflict by way of qualitative and quantitative forms of reasoning and understanding.
- **1C** 'History Computer Games and Simulations in Teaching of History' *Dr Tony McArthur, Catholic Education Commission* Computer games are played by almost all young people. This talk will explore the link between players of history games and their engagement with history.
- **1D** 'Postmodernism in drag: Revisiting the Macarthurs of Elizabeth Farm' Gary Crockett, curator Elizabeth Farm
 The house museum 'treatment' of Australia's oldest European dwelling Elizabeth Farm, combines theatre, romance, archival rigour and imagination in highly surprising and successful ways.

1E 'Why our students need to know about Churchill!' – Ken Webb, Pymble Ladies College

Themes tackled will include: "Churchill, most important figure in History"; "The left should take Churchill's legend from the right"; "Learn about Churchill & you learn about the late C19th & C20th"; and "Why historians & commentators can't leave Churchill alone".

- 2A 'Searching for Balance: The Sinking of the SIEV X case study' Donnie Maclurcan, University of Technology
 This presentation will explain the rationale, process and challenges faced by an independent group in their creation of a Case Study on a recent and highly controversial event.
- 2B 'Developing Consistency of Teacher Judgement in Awarding Stage 5 Grades' *LIMIT OF 15* Kate Cameron & Kerrie Blight, BOS Senior Assessment & Project officers resp. This workshop uses course performance descriptors & authentic student work samples to identify the characteristics of student performance at different grade levels, (focusing on Stage 5). Participants are expected to engage in workshop activities.

2C 'How Archival Records can Contribute to the Life of a School' – Evangeline Galettis, archivist, St Catherine's School An e-learning program will be demonstrated that uses archives and combines it with technology to teach history to students using their own environment and school history.

2D 'Revolution to regeneration: Arts in Germany 1919-39' – *Michael Spurr, Executive Director HTA Victoria*An overview of the artistic revolutions of the Weimar era and the emergence of a National Socialist style.

3A 'Significance of Civics Education to Adolescents' – Judy Adnum, Civics Consultant DET

Ninety 14 & 15 yr students from 3 diverse educational institutions were surveyed to discover what civics meant to them. What components of the syllabus were engaging for them? What other aspects of civics mattered to them? Can these results inform future directions so that civics education is relevant for life?

3B 'Our Nation's First Capital: Federation and Melbourne' – Diane Gardiner, Public Record Office Victoria (PROV) PROV's online exhibition provides a virtual tour of Federation celebrations and sites of the 25 years of Federal government in Melbourne, illustrating life at the turn of the century. Discover the various aspects of government as we 'tour' government buildings, and explore online resources on women's suffrage.

3C 'Historical Literacy: Beyond the written word' – David Vassallo, The Kings School

This workshop will examine practical strategies of implementing literacy in the history classroom through assessment and classroom activities.

3D 'Nazi Propaganda through film: Leni Riefenstahl' – *Lubna Haddad, The McDonald College*

This paper will discuss Nazi propaganda in general (aims & methods), along with a discussion of Leni's work as propaganda, art and history.

"Disparately Seeking Chif" – Source, Text, Memory and Ben Chifley's Story for Theatre and Film – Dr Robin McLachlan, Charles Sturt Uni, co-author 'A Local Man: play about Ben Chifley' Drawing on experiences with the play, 'A Local Man' and the documentary 'The Chifley's of Busby Street', this talk will explore challenges encountered as an historian working in these mediums.

'National Values and the Chinese question'

– Prof John Fitzgerald, La Trobe University, author 'Big White Lie' The Chinese were excluded in the White Australia era, because their 'habits, instincts & culture' were incompatible with Australian foundation values of mateship, democracy & fair-go. But what is Australian about them? How were they applied in the past as a measure of who was Australian? How did Chinese-Australians cope from mid-C19th to mid-C20th with this discrimination, not based on race but on their alien values and culture?

1A 'Sandakan: Australia's greatest tragedy of WWII'

- Lynette Ramsay Silver, investigative writer, Historical consultant In 1942-43 over 2500 allied POWs were transferred from Singapore to Sandakan, Borneo to provide slave labour for an airstrip. 3 years later at the war's end, there were six left alive. The fate of the others remained shrouded in mystery until 1998 when Lynette Silver broke the conspiracy of silence. Join her as she unravels the story behind Sandakan's tragedy – one of WWII's most deadly secrets.

1B 'Constructing Australia' – *Jacqui Stone, Film Australia* Triumph, tragedies and political intrigues in building a nation.

1C 'The Future of Modern History'

 Paul Kiem, Chief Examiner Modern History (2003-06), chair last Modern History Board Curriculum Committee

This presentation will offer some thoughts on the current Modern History syllabus and the state of the subject in NSW. It will also attempt to provoke discussion on the next Modern History syllabus (in the context of either a state or national curriculum).

1D 'Foucault's Place in Postmodernism and Extension History' – Dr Sam Jackson, Shore School

This seminar encourages teaches to stretch their students by studying Foucault in the History Extension course. Unlike most labelled postmodernists, Foucault left works of history which can be more easily read and analysed.

2A 'Have your say in ... the Gallery of Australian Democracy Initiative at Old Parliament House' – *Glenda Smith, OPH* You will have the opportunity to contribute to an exciting new learning initiative exploring the history of Australian Democracy.

2B 'Low Level ICT for High Level History'

Richard Ford, St Andrews Cathedral School
 Discover how to use low level ICT to heighten the level at which your history students are working.

2C 'A Different Style of Teaching History'

- Helen Nichol, Erasmus School Victoria

The ancient Vedic concept of History is surprisingly relevant. Used by national and international schools, learn how events of History readily become present & valuable with this method, and how it naturally causes student enquiry into values & principles.

 Hear about a successful approach which involves having students 'live' the subject rather than merely 'study' it. You will look at case studies from civics, colonial history, the world wars.
